Those words are generally used during Robert Burns' 'Address to a Haggis', but they can most certainly be used to describe the Hunter Valley Scots Club Burns Night Supper & Ceilidh held on

Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> February at Club Macquarie which, we are delighted to report, was a total sellout!

Starring, for the first time, the almighty talents of Highlander Celtic Rock Band with piper Justin Body, who has recently returned from Scotland after being one of the selected few pipers to perform at The Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo.

Also featured were The Miners' Pipe Band, Highland dancers with Enya and the Justine Daly School of Highland dancing,



plenty of Scottish Ceilidh Dancing and, of course, the traditional 'Address to a Haggis' being performed this year by an inspiring young man, Lachlan King who, at the age of just twelve years, old has mastered this famous Burns' poem and we were all overwhelmed watching this talented young boy representing the next generation at work, for it is through the likes of Lachlan that will ensure our Scottish traditions and culture will live on far into the future.

#### Robert Burns – Poet Extraordinaire

Robert Burns, also known familiarly as Rabbie Burns, was born in Alloway, Ayrshire on the

25<sup>th</sup> January 1759. A Scottish poet and lyricist who is widely regarded as the national poet of Scotland and is celebrated internationally. He is the best known of the poets who have written in the Scots language, although much of his writing is in a "light Scots dialect" of English, accessible to an audience worldwide.

He is regarded as a pioneer of the romantic movement, and after his death on 21 July 1796 at the young age of 37, he became a great source of inspiration to the founders of both liberalism and socialism, and a cultural icon in Scotland and around the world. Celebration of his life and work became almost a national charismatic cult during the 19th and 20th

centuries, and his influence has long been strong on Scottish literature. In 2009 he was chosen as the greatest Scot by the Scottish public in a vote run by Scottish television channel STV.

As well as making original compositions, Burns also collected folk songs from across Scotland, often revising or adapting them. His poem (and song) 'Auld Lang Syne' is traditionally sung at Hogmanay (New Year's Eve), and 'Scots Wha Hae' served for a long time as an unofficial national anthem of the country. Other poems and songs of Burns that remain well known across the world today include 'A Red, Red Rose', 'A Man's a Man for A' That', 'To a Louse', 'To a Mouse', 'The Battle of Sherramuir, 'Tam o' Shanter' and 'Ae Fond Kiss'.

But perhaps the most famous of all Robert Burns' odes, along with 'Auld Lang Syne' is his 'Address to a Haggis', which will always be a major part of a Burns' Night Supper.

## St. Andrews' Day Service

On a bright and sunny Sunday morning in late November the HVSC committee and other members attended The Scots Kirk in Hamilton to honour St. Andrew, Patron Saint of Scotland. Our flags



were paraded and piped in and the Reverend David Robertson led an excellent service. History tells us that St Andrew was an apostle of Jesus. According to the New Testament, he was a fisherman and one of the Twelve Apostles chosen by Jesus. St. Andrew was officially named the Patron Saint of Scotland in 1320 when the Declaration of Arbroath was signed. It was a letter written in 1320 by Scottish barons to Pope John XXII in response to the Pope's excommunication of King Robert the Bruce for not

respecting a truce in the First War of Scottish Independence. The letter asked the Pope to recognize Scotland's independence and Robert the Bruce as the country's rightful king.
